COME AND HEAR JUDGE WELCH MONDAY EVENING, JUNE 9th

The next rousing get-together of Valpo alumni in Chicago will be held Monday evening, June 9, commencing with dinner promptly at 6:30. As before, the King Cole Room of the Hamilton Club, 18 South Dearborn Street, is the meeting place.

Judge Ninian H. Welch, who needs no introduction to a gathering of Valparaiso University friends here, will be the principal speaker. There will be a variety of special music and a rousing "pep" session for the glory of the old school on College Hill.

There are between 4,000 and 5,000 former Valpo students in Chicago and vicinity, and a finer spirit of enthusiasm never did prevail here. A new day has dawned at Valparaiso University, and at each of the bi-weekly meetings of the local alumni the latest reports of the progress of the great movement to bring "2,000 students to Valpa-

raiso this fall," under the leadership of Mr. Sampson, are announced.

RULES OF THE CHICAGO BROWN AND KINSEY CONTEST

- 1st.—The winners in the contest between the BROWN and KINSEY colors will be given a complimentary dinner at the Hamilton Club at the end of the campaign.
- 2nd—All the judges to be selected later will grade in the following manner:
 - (a) All new names not now on our Mailing List for Chicago and vicinity, for each name..... 1 point
 - (b) Each new student obtained to attend Valparaiso University will count 5 points
 - (c) Each \$1 of cash contribution will count 1 point
 - (d) Each \$1 of pledged contribution will count 1/2 point
- 3rd—Each Captain will select immediately four Lieutenants for his or her Team and submit their names and addresses in writing to Cecil Smith, Manager, Room 815, 11 So. La Salle Street.
- 4th—All workers may see anyone anywhere at any time regardless of assigned cards.
- 5th—All workers are expected to see those whose cards are assigned to them.
- 6th—All workers are expected to attend all bi-weekly meetings and report the results of their efforts.
- 7th—All Lieutenants will deliver their reports to their Team Captain, and each Team Captain will be called on for a report at each meeting, and he is instructed to place all information and checks in a "Report Envelope", marking plainly on the face of the envelope:
 - (a) The Team and Division,
 - (b) The aggregate amount of cash,
 - (c) Number of new students,
 - (d) Number of new names,
 - (e) Amount pledged.
- 8th—If unsuccessful in signing up the prospect, return card to your Team Captain with appropriate notation. (Such cards should be promptly re-assigned, unless it appears undesirable to the Executive Committee.)
- 9th—If you know one or more prospects whose contribution you believe you can secure but for whom you have no card, you may "request" such cards, the request to be made through your Team Captain and executed by your Division Secretary.
- 10th—Wherever possible secure cash with the pledge; if this cannot be done, the contributor will be billed at the end of the campaign.
- 11th—If any Team Captain cannot be present at any meeting, submit your report to one of your Lieutenants, who will make the report for you.

TEAM NUMBER 2 PLEDGES \$885 IN ONE WEEK'S TIME

Among the team captains to report at the May 12 meeting, the premier honors went, without question, to Dr. E. Chesrow of Team No. 2, Kinsey Division. In less than one week's time he secured pledges totaling \$855 for the new student fund. That gave his team a credit of 447½ points, which Campaign Manager Smith prominently recorded on his big blackboard.

Dr. Chesrow has set a pace which has spurred other team captains to merry competition during the next few weeks.

NOT AN ENDOWMENT FUND

Chicago alumni are pledging themselves to make a good showing before July 1. All money received here will be held in trust by Judge Charles F. McDonald, vice-president of the Foreman Trust & Savings Bank, and a loyal Valpo graduate. It will ultimately be used to help defray the expenses of the well-organized new student drive under the chairmanship of Mr. Lewis D. Sampson, and for no other purpose.
