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AUTHOR BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES (IN ORDER OF APPEARANCE)

Joyce P. Jacobsen is Professor of Economics at Hobart and William Smith Colleges, as well as Andrews Professor of Economics, Emerita, at Wesleyan University. She served as president of Hobart and William Smith, and as provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs at Wesleyan. She has published mainly in feminist, gender, and labor economics, including articles on gender segregation, migration, and the effects of labor force intermittency on women's earnings. She is author or coauthor of *All the Campus Lawyers: Litigation, Regulation, and the New Era of Higher Education* (2024), *Advanced Introduction to Feminist Economics* (2020), *The Economics of Gender* (3rd ed., 2007), and *Labor Markets and Employment Relationships* (2004), as well as coeditor of *Queer Economics: A Reader* (2007). Prof. Jacobsen is a recipient of the American Economic Association's Carolyn Shaw Bell Award, a former president of the International Association for Feminist Economics, and president-elect of the Eastern Economic Association.

Ellen L. Csikai, LCSW, MPH, PhD, is Professor in the School of Social Work at the University of Alabama. Prior to her academic career, Dr. Csikai was a social work practitioner in medical settings such as trauma hospital setting (ICU) and hospice care. Dr. Csikai teaches primarily in MSW and PhD social work programs in the areas of research methods, practice theory, social work practice in the areas of gerontological health, and end-of-life and palliative care. Dr. Csikai is the founding and ongoing editor of the *Journal of Social Work in End-of-Life and Palliative Care*, encompassing more than 20 years. Along with the journal, she is engaged in education, research, scholarship, and advocacy for palliative and end-of-life care. Her research primarily addresses communication and treatment decisions among older seriously ill adults, including oncology and their family members, and healthcare professionals with a special focus on caregivers of older adults with serious illness. She has engaged in research projects over the years and has published extensively. She works internationally with colleagues in Spain (Fulbright Senior Scholar, 2024), Hungary (Fulbright Scholar, 2008), and Cuba. She has devoted her career to the development of social work research and interventions in the field of end-of-life and palliative care and to improving the quality of life for older adults and families at perhaps the most important time in life.

Quentin R. Maynard, LMSW, MSW, PhD, is an assistant professor in the Social Work department at the University of Southern Indiana (USI). Dr. Maynard serves as the program director of the Master of Social Work (MSW) & Online Advanced Studies in Addiction Science (OASAS) programs at USI. Dr. Maynard's research interests focus broadly on older adults with serious illness and near the end of life. His completed and ongoing research have specifically focused on older adults' conception of a good death.

Rohan Angadi is a predoctoral researcher at the Ohio State University and is involved in a project with a leading commercial bank with the aim of evaluating alternate underwriting criteria for household credit instruments. He also helps a project with a nonprofit
