Index to *Tolkien Studies*, volume 1 (2004) through volume 18 (2021)

Tolkien Studies: An Annual Scholarly Review was co-founded by Douglas A. Anderson, Michael D.C. Drout, and Verlyn Flieger. All volumes have been published by West Virginia University Press, in hardcover editions for the first eleven volumes, and subsequently in trade paperback volumes. The three founders co-edited the first nine volumes, after which Anderson left because of a dispute with the publisher. With volume ten, the editorial staff became Michael D.C. Drout, Verlyn Flieger, and David Bratman.

The contents of *Tolkien Studies* comprises five core sections containing articles, notes and documents, book reviews, an annual review essay (recently becoming multi-authored) on the Year's Work in Tolkien Studies, and a Bibliography (in English), also multi-authored, which serves as the basic listing for what is to be covered in the annual review in a subsequent volume.

Each volume of *Tolkien Studies* also contains some editorial matter that I have not indexed. This material includes: the "Editors' Introduction," "Notes on Submissions," "Acknowledgments," "Conventions and Abbreviations," in the front of each volume; and the "Notes on the Contributors" at the rear of each volume. Some volumes also have obituaries, and I have indexed these (some are signed; many are anonymous, but by one or another of the editors).

For this index, I have listed the contributions, alphabetically by author, in two sections, the first comprising articles, notes, documents, annual reviews and bibliographies; the second section containing only book reviews. Anderson served as Book Review editor for volumes II through VIII and for part of IX (there were no book reviews in volume I); Bratman took over as the Book Review editor with volume X. Any user of this index looking for the review of a specific book should use the search function on this pdf, which will also be useful for finding things in a number of additional ways. Some contributors have appeared more than once using slightly different bylines (e.g., with or without a middle initial). Such entries are combined under one name.
